EUROATLANTIC SECURITY AND CRISIS MANAGEMENT

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This article briefly presents the international security environment developments, evaluated in a realistic way in the new "Strategic Concept – NATO (Lisbon 2010)"; potential threats and hazards, both military and non-military, are present on a global, regional, national scale, determining an adequate NATO and EU reaction, and also from the member states.
